The Virtual Learning Strategy (VLS) was an investment made by the Ontario Ministry of Colleges and Universities to drive growth and advancement of virtual learning across the postsecondary institutions in Ontario.

The VLS was built on three key principles:



Collaborative

The VLS prioritized collaboration for sector transformation that impacts all institutions.



Learner-driven

The VLS drove virtual learning excellence for all learners in Ontario, now and into the future.



Digital by design

The VLS supported the development of online content that is digital by design.

Being a lifelong learner


Enabling learners to meet the needs of the rapidly evolving labour market at any stage of their careers by providing digital supports and infrastructure for new short duration training.



Being a global leader



Milestones & Achievements

The diagram below demonstrates the timeline and impacts of each round of the VLS. The outcomes and impacts of each round build upon one another to drive growth and advancement of virtual learning. VLS project teams were asked a series of qualitative questions related to their projects and its anticipated impacts across the sector. Open-ended responses were analyzed using an inductive thematic analysis. Project elements were also reviewed for their relation or relevance to particular focuses. Major themes and aggregate quantitative findings were triangulated and are presented together below.



Legacy of the VLS



The eCampusOntario Open Library provides educators and learners with access to open educational materials, tools, and practices that can be used, shared, and adapted in the digital environment. The eCampusOntario Open Library is the largest Open Educational Resource (OER) repository in Canada.

The VLS made significant investments into the content within and the infrastructure that supports the Open Library. That growth is demonstrated in the visual below.



Collaboration



A year after the closing of the first round of the Virtual Learning Strategy (VLS), eCampusOntario's Research and Foresight team reached out to the designated contacts of project teams in June and July of 2023 in order to understand the impacts of their projects.

Some project teams indicated that they have **continued to collaborate** with, or plan to further collaborate with, their project partners. When asked of the nature of **continued** collaborations, projects teams that were involved in **inter-institutional collaborations** mentioned:

- sustaining the work done collaboratively through their VLS project
- adapting and disseminating the outputs for their VLS project
- working together on new projects

Project teams that had **industry partners** responded that their **collaborations** have **continued** and that the impact on students has been positive. One project team specifically mentioned that their project outputs became **tangible examples of the services and benefits** that their industry partner can provide to other clients.
