LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

We acknowledge this land out of respect for the Indigenous nations who have cared for Turtle Island, also called North America, from before the arrival of settler peoples until this day. Most importantly, we remember the history of these lands has been tainted by poor treatment and a lack of friendship with the First Nations who call them home.

CANADIAN INDIGENOUS MUSIC SHOWCASE

Introduction

The prophecy foretells the historical and spiritual journey of the Anishinaabe people, describing seven different phases or “fires” that represent different periods and events. While interpretations may vary among different communities, the general themes often include predictions about the arrival of Europeans, the impact of colonization, and the potential for a reawakening and renewal of Indigenous identity and spirituality.

The Seven Fires Prophecy is an oral tradition, and interpretations may vary among Anishinaabe communities. The prophecy is seen by many as a guide for understanding the historical and spiritual challenges faced by the Anishinaabe people and, by extension, other Indigenous nations. Kruse et al. (2019).

The connection between the Seven Fires Prophecy and Canadian Indigenous music is essential because Indigenous music varies among nations and communities. In the context of the Seven Fires Prophecy, these musicians use their work to explore themes related to the prophecy, such as resilience, cultural revitalization, and the ongoing journey of Indigenous peoples. Based on the prophecy’s teachings, the lyrics touch upon historical events, cultural preservation, and the hope for a positive future.

THE IMPORTANCE OF 2SLGBTQ+ LITERATURE

Introduction

Representation in literature and media is incredibly important, as it can aid in increasing viewers' self-esteem and provide validation and support, especially if a viewer comes from a marginalized group and/or if they are young (Nadal, 2021). This is especially true when certain groups have faced distinct underrepresentation and exclusion from the majority of the stories that we see. The 2SLGBTQ+ community is one such community that has been significantly excluded from mainstream storytelling around the world and throughout history. Even today, this censorship of the 2SLGBTQ+ is prolific, considering that almost half of the books that are being banned in places like the United States feature 2SLGBTQ+ characters, themes, and authors (Monteil, 2022).

This is why authors like Richard Siken are so important, as they provide representation both as a diverse author themselves and by introducing representation into their works. Richard Siken is a disabled, queer author who writes poetry that speaks to the experience of being a member of the 2SLGBTQ+ community.

This educational resource, therefore, focuses on the history of the 2SLGBTQ+ community, in regards to their inclusion or lack thereof in literature and media, the cultural significance of Richard Siken, and the work of Richard Siken.

The Military widows live in a culture that is so small and so unique. We felt that the hardships and memories that the widows carry with them are a culture that deserves a proper exhibit to highlight the pain, struggles and triumphs that they endure to honour their fallen soldiers.

When the administrative paperwork has been done after the blur of the funeral arrangements has passed, the extended friends and family have gone, the military culture they once felt a part of is forever changed, and all there is left is the silent sorrow of a widow.

As Monica Bobbit (2022) states, “You don’t just lose someone once. You lose them every day. Over and over again. For the rest of your life.”

Within this digital artifact, you are invited to expand your understanding of the history of the Canadian Armed Forces and the military culture. Furthermore, the exhibit provides a focus on military widowhood, offering an exclusive interview with an active commanding officer and another with a military widow who dedicates her time to advocating for and articulating the challenges unique to the experience of widowhood. Additionally, you will have the opportunity to hear from military widows as they articulate and expand upon their lived experiences. Complemented by a photo/video gallery, the exhibit seeks to provide a holistic perspective on the aftermath of the loss of a soldier, aiming to foster a deeper understanding of the multifaceted impact on the lives of those left behind, particularly the widows.
